## Life Everlasting

The second book of Maccabees tells a powerful story, and a rather gruesome one at that. But central to it, beyond the horrible deaths inflicted upon the brothers and their mother, is their belief in the promise of resurrection and life everlasting in God.

Paul asks the Thessalonians to pray for him as he spreads Christ's message of love, so that he might be delivered from other nonbelievers anxious to do him harm. The apostle is confident in such prayer, just as he is confident in the everlasting support of Jesus and God the Father.

And there's that "everlasting" word again. The Sadducees, not buying the idea, ask Jesus an interesting—albeit meaningless—question about the status of married life at the Resurrection. He tells the non-believers that marriage isn't an issue for the risen children of God. More importantly, he assures them that their ancestors do live on in God, even as evidenced by the Father's words to Moses.

## Ask Fr. George...

Q. Does the wine (the Blood of Christ) have to be red or can white wine be used?

A. There are only three requirements for the sacramental wine used at Mass: it must be between 6% & 18% alcohol; it must be made of fruit of the vine (grapes); it may not contain any additives. Here is what's important to know about the many elements of the Mass; while the Church uses many of the words and actions of Jesus and the customary traditions, vestments, and formats of Judaic liturgy - much of which is prescribed and described in the Book of Leviticus, She (the Church) does not try to **mimic** anything. For instance, at the last supper, we are told that Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it and gave it to His apostles; at the Consecration during the Eucharistic prayer, the priest takes the bread, then prays over it reciting the words of Jesus, "take this, all of you and eat of it, for this is my Body which will be given up for you." Notice that the priest does NOT break the 'bread' at this time, he does it immediately prior to the distribution of Holy Communion. Therefore our actions resemble what Jesus did but do not **mimic** what He did. So just because blood is red, it does not necessarily stand that the wine used for the Consecration must be red so that it will 'look' like or **mimic** blood. We don't know what color the wine was that Jesus used at the Last supper, and it doesn't matter because we are told, "He took the chalice filled with wine", not "filled with red wine".

Both white and red wine were common at the time of Jesus as is today. In fact, remember the story of the wedding feast of Cana when Mary told Jesus they had no wine. He had the stewards fill the jugs with water and the Scripture reads, "THEN HE SAID TO THEM, 'DRAW SOME OUT NOW AND TAKE IT TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE FEAST.' THEY DID THIS; THE PRESIDENT TASTED THE WATER, AND IT HAD TURNED INTO WINE." Jn 2:9. So when the president of the feast took the drink, it was still clear (white), like water, though it was wine. So even though it wasn't red, it was wine and he wasn't surprised that it was not red, he was only surprised as to how good it was!

Then how do we determine whether to use white wine or red wine, a rosé or an amber? Well the secret is usually the priest's palette! Remember, please, that at the Consecration, the bread and the wine change in their 'essence', in their 'reality' into the Body and Blood of Christ, they do not change in their physical properties! The 'Bread' still tastes like bread, and the 'Wine' still tastes like wine, the matter hasn't changed, only their essence. I happen to like a dry red wine, and it appears that some of the pastors before me preferred red wine as well, so that is what we use.
