NO COMPARISONS

How many times have we read or heard about someone who's gotten into trouble—maybe even fired from a job—because of a brush with the law? While our "Christian" minds tell us to be sorry and even pray for the person, a little voice inside our heads may also be saying, "I'm glad I would never do anything like that."

And perhaps we wouldn't. But are there some things we do that are still not pleasing in God's eyes? Today's readings caution us not to look so intently at someone else's wrongdoing that we overlook our own weaknesses and shortcomings. When we measure ourselves against the worst people we can think of, we come out looking pretty good. There is a danger, however, in using someone else's behavior as a way of reflecting our own goodness.

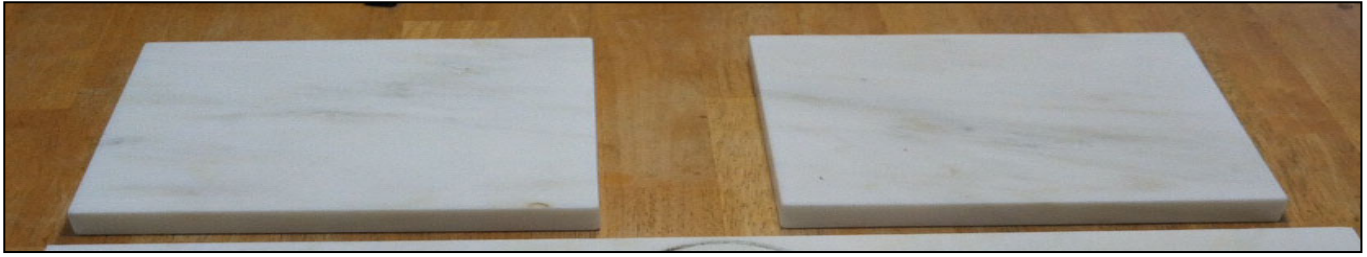

Ask Fr. George...

Q. The 8th grade CCD students would like to know why are candidates for canonization required to have miracles attributed to them before they can be canonized?

A. There are a lot of things that need to happen before anyone is declared a saint. Let's first look at what it means to be canonized. By declaring someone a saint, the Church is, without error, saying that the life of that person is worthy of emulating or copying and is worthy of our veneration. That means that the person in question must have lived a virtuous life in union with the Sacred Scriptures and Church teaching. In order to determine the kind of life a person really lead, rather than what hype or popularity might dictate, intense investigation must take place.

The Congregation for the Causes of the Saints, which oversees the entire process, must first determine if there is sufficient reason to open a 'cause' which is usually by petition of the Bishop of the Diocese where the potential candidate lived / died. Then the Congregation determines if there is sufficient "fame of sanctity" or "fame of martyrdom" and if there is, the Church will investigate the candidate's writings to see if they possess "purity of doctrine," essentially, nothing heretical or against the faith. All this evidence is gathered and sent to Rome for a tribunal or panel of theologians to analyze and vote on for further action. Once a candidate is declared to have lived life with heroic virtue, they may be declared Venerable.

It is at this point that a miracle must be credited to the candidate unless they died for the faith and are beatified and declared "Blessed" by virtue of martyrdom itself. Otherwise, the candidate must be credited with a verifiable miracle. Before the "Blessed" can be canonized, yet another verifiable miracle must be credited to them. These miracles are usually, and recently almost exclusively, medical miracles. A documented illness or injury that results in an almost instantaneous healing – eliminating the possibility of a natural or medical cure- that could only be the result of Divine intervention, are practically the only acceptable types of miracles.

So why are miracles necessary? Well there is a whole lot of human investigation and all human activity is subject to error. So before the Church can make an infallible statement regarding someone's absolute presence in Heaven, She waits for God to sanction Her decision. If there is no miracle, then God is likely saying no! If there is a miracle, then the Church feels secure that what She is about to declare is in fact okay with God!
