It's Advent! Come Lord Jesus!

Taken from the Latin word *adventus*, which was used in particular to celebrate the coming of the emperor— either in anticipation of, or to celebrate the fact that he came. This event only happened very infrequently for most Roman cities, perhaps only once in a lifetime, so when the anniversary of his coming, or coming (I know there is no such word but it fits here) approaches, the people would spend much time and effort in preparing their city for his arrival. The streets had to be swept, the bushes trimmed, the sewage washed away and the beggars had to be sent to the outskirts!

We, of course, celebrate Advent as an anticipation rather than something that has happened and past. So each year we start with a fresh new Liturgical season as we prepare for the three (3) comings of Christ – officially it's only two, but when we make Christmas a real personal event, it's three. 1. The first coming when Jesus was born into the world; 2. The second coming in glory at the end of time, referred to as the Parousia in Greek; 3. the coming of Christ into our lives each day that we live.

It is good for us to reflect and prepare for each of these coming of our Blessed Lord. While the historic event has happened and passed, preparing to celebrate that event is important for our faith journey as we come to realize the incredible Love that God has for us that He chose to become one like us. This is no small matter and our whole salvation history revolves around this event. Just as we prepare a special event to celebrate someone's great achievement or birth, fact that have already happened, so too it is right and necessary for us to celebrate this incredible historic moment.

Reflecting on the end of times or Christ's second coming, can be a daunting matter, filled with anxiety and sometimes trepidation. But it is a more than a fact, it is a promise to those who live in faith. It's a promise of justice and a promise of victory, a promise of glory and a promise of lasting peace – with all that, it really isn't such a bad thing to anticipate.

The coming of Christ into our daily lives is, I believe, the real challenge of Christmas. A challenge for us to realize the immeasurable passion and mercy that God has for us, not just on special days or certain circumstances, but every day. How often do we meditate on Christ's presence in our lives – especially when times are most difficult? Is it even possible to anticipate Christ coming into my life each day? It is, and Advent is the training time for that.

This weekend is referred to as Gaudete Sunday. The Introit (Opening Antiphon) for this Sunday, is taken from Philippians 4:4,5: "*Gaudete in Domino semper*" ("Rejoice in the Lord always"). Like Lent, Advent is a penitential season, so the priest normally wears purple vestments. But on Gaudete Sunday, having passed the midpoint of Advent, the Church lightens the mood a little, and the priest may wear rose vestments (if the church has them). The change in color provides us with encouragement to continue our spiritual preparation—especially prayer and fasting—for Christmas. For this same reason, the third candle of the Advent wreath, first lit on Gaudete Sunday, is traditionally rose-colored. Come Lord Jesus.
